

Key Stage 4 (Years 10 and 11) Reports

How many reports will there be?

In year 10, there will be 3 reports – one each term

In year 11, there will be 3 reports – 2 in the first term and 1 in the second term.

What information will the report include?

The top of the report will include:

Attendance figures – since the start of September

Total behaviour incidents – since the start of September

How do the Grades work?

Most subjects use GCSE 9 to 1 grades. These may also include a + or – sub grade.

Health and Social Care, IT and Enterprise and Marketing use vocational grades which use distinction *, distinction, merit and pass at levels 2 and 1. Additional maths uses A/S level grading of A to E.

Target grades are minimum targets for the end of the course. These are broken down into term target grades. Details of these targets are here:

For each term, a working at grade will be awarded by the teacher.

How does Attitude to Learning (ATL) work?

Grade descriptors for Attitude to Learning are as follows:

4 - Exceeding Expectations:

- Always displays excellent behaviour and is focused in class. Always takes part in discussions. Keeps going when challenged. Work is presented well.
- Homework is always completed to a high standard.

3 – Expected:

- Routinely displays good behaviour. Keeps going when challenged. Takes pride in most aspects of work.
- Homework is always completed on time to a good standard.

2 – Below Expected:

- Can behave well in class but this is not consistent. Does not always show resilience when challenged. Presentation is not consistent.
- Homework is usually completed on time but not to a high standard.

1 – Cause for Concern:

- Disrupts their own learning or the learning of others. More resilience needed to make expected progress.
- Homework is regularly incomplete.
