Planning for each subject


 Step 1. Enter all of the subjects you will be studying for below. As you get them, there are also spaces to enter your exam dates. You'll also be able to get these from your teachers, or from the exam board websites


Step 2. Using the Revision Time Per Subject already worked out, allocate an amount of revision time for each subject. You might decide to revise each subject equally, or there may be some that are harder or more important to
you that you need to spend more time on - it's fine to do this, but remember that means there'll be less time to spend on other subjects if you do. Sometimes, if it doesn't work out at this stage, you have to go back to Stage 1
and commit more timer per day - it's better to know this now and be able to do something about it!





Timetable

- On your timetable sheet, write your subjects.
- On the left of the subject box, number them in order of how confident you feel – 1 is least confident, 10 is most.
- On the right of the subject box, number the subjects in order of how much revision you think you need in that subject. 1 is the least, 10 is the most.



Filling in the boxes

 Now decide how many of the 25 boxes on Sunday to Thursday you are going to use for revision.

 At this stage it needs to be at least 14 sessions of 40 minutes with a break in between.

• Blank out any times when you are not available – sports, work...

Start to populate your timetable.

Refining your revision

- As you approach the mocks and then final exams, you will need to copy this timetable and make bespoke weeks.
- Alternatively, there are several apps that will provide the same.

- You will need to list the aspects of each subject that you need to work on and then plan those in.
- For example, if it is clear that you don't understand graphs in maths, write that into several blocks in the same week so that you can nail this and really learn it properly.

- Vary what and how you revise
- Timetables will sharpen your revision and make every second count
